Hints of spring at market

If you can find the stand for Fratello Sole amidst the dozens and dozens of crisp white awnings that make up the Palm Beach Gardens GreenMarket, there's a chance you won't want to leave the booth.

You can stay for hours watching, mesmerized, as Chef Oscar Lippe works his way through a 20-pound leg of Spanish Serrano ham – precise, with short, methodical cuts.

"The Serrano ham [comes from] a white pig," he explained to me. 'What makes it so good is that the fat is intertwined with the meat. It's marbled in because of the exercising the hog does. It is not apparent in Iberian ham and much less in prosciutto."

He sells about 45 pounds of Serrano ham every Sunday.

In addition to the delicious ham, which shouldn't be missed for an instant, Fratello Sole sells a variety of artisanal hormone-free, chemical free, nitrate free, pasture-raised, organic, hand-stuffed and airdried sausages. I fell for the Cacciatorini sausage made with wine, garlic and herbs.

And then there's the

You could spend another hour here, listening to the lullaby of names and descriptions, the countries of origin and diet of the animals that gave us such delicious cheese, the taste and the textures, enough to make you forget about the market bustling just feet away.

After taste-testing through a few delectable kinds, I left with a hunk of Pecorino Sardo (\$12 a pound) and a most delicious soft sheep's cheese, a smoked Idazabel (\$30 a pound) – they told me the sheep had grazed on luscious fields filled with lavender, and I'm quite sure I could taste the

springtime in this cheese. If you're clever, you'll leave the tent with a few
