Artistic 'Lawn Jobs'

In his new exhibition at the Art and Culture Center of Hollywood, Miami artist/grass aficionado Don Lambert takes a Weedwacker to America's obsession with pristinely manicured lawns in suburbs and small towns. Take, for example, his "Swerve, Slalom, Brake. Rainbow," an artificial-turf-on-wood-canvas depicting a striped lawn, a throwback to the artist's heady teenage years mowing yards. (The piece is likewise a nod to the artist's own admitted mischievousness, as he may have barreled a car or three through a neighbor's yard during those sweaty summers.) Setting sail with Awolnation

When electro-rockers Awolnation come to Revolution Live on Friday, the band will still be riding a wave of success generated by their breakthrough album, 2011's "Megalithic Symphony," and its Billboard-charting single, "Sail." That song, stamped as it is with piano riffs, muscular electro rhythms and pierced by Aaron Bruno's top-of-his-lungs scream, was strong enough to peak fifth on Billboard's Alternative Songs chart. The not-quite-3-year-old quintet "went from opening for Weezer and MGMT to headlining out of the gate at Coachella last year,"

Bruno recalled during a phone interview last week. "From 400 to 1,000 people to 20,000 in the audience? We just started building city by city. That's nuts." Perhaps, but the Los Angeles-raised rocker, who admits he goes surfing off the coast of Santa Barbara to "take the edge off" is no slouch. The band is working on their still-untitled second album (with Bruno as its only songwriter), and will take Revolution's stage (100 SW Third Ave., Fort Lauderdale) at 7 p.m. with L.A. indie-pop opener Blondfire. \$22. 954-449-1025 or JointheRevolution.net.


Electronica mania



